**FISHING AT CASTLECONNELL.**—The rain for the past week has caused a rise of water, and consequently sport has been on the look-up. The end of the season usually yields salmon of a large size, and this week we have to record the capture of a huge fish of 46lbs. This fish was of beautiful proportions and in very good condition, considering the lateness of the season. It was taken by Mr H Hodges on the Doonass water, on 26th, and the rod used was a 16 feet peal rod made at Messrs Enright's establishment. Besides this fish Mr Hodges also killed one salmon 24lbs and one peal 4lbs on 19th; one salmon 27lbs and one peal 5lbs on 20th; one salmon 21lbs on 24th; on Woodlands Capt Bayly killed one salmon 25lbs on 19th.

#### IMPORTANT CO. LIMERICK C. SUIT.

*Dore v. Vaughan.*

This was an action, brought for administration of the present estate of Dore, who died at Mount Plumm neighbourhood of Newcastle West, Co. in July, 1892. Mr Meredith, Q.C., with Mr F Doyle (instructed by Messrs Conno solicitors Limerick), appeared for the Daniel Dore, who sued as legatee. He contended that there were two questions involved—first, whether two sums of £1,800 respectively, which stood a death on deposit receipt in the bank at Newcastle West in the joint names of testator and wife, and were dealt with in his part of his assets, or passed by survivor to widow; and secondly, in case these were held not to be assets, a question of the part of the widow between the benefits derived by her under the will.

Mr George Wright, Q.C. (with Mr Derrick Fleming (instructed by Mr Rolfe solicitor, Newcastle West), appeared for the widow, Mr James Vaughan, and submitted that these questions should be settled and responsibility was thrown on him.

Mr M J Bourke, Q.C., with Mr W appeared for the widow, Mary Moore, and contended that the first question should be decided without reference to chambers.

The Vice-Chancellor made an order for administration with a direction for an account to be taken in chambers as to the circumstances under which the money was lodged in the joint names.
