MORTALITY STATISTICS.—The average annual death-rate represented by the deaths registered last week in the sixteen principal Town Districts of Ireland was 22.5 per 1.000 of the population. The deaths registered in the past week in the several towns, alphabetically arranged, corresponded to the following annual rates per 1,000:—Armagh, 140; Belfast, 258; Cork, 201; Drogheda, 176; Dublin, 228; Dundalk, 42; Galway, 302; Kilkenny, 378; Limerick, 168; Galway, 302; Kilkenny, 378; Limerick, 168; Lisburn, 213; Londonderry, 126; Lurgan, 46; Newry, 201; Sligo, 203; Waterford, 200; Wexford, 31.6. The deaths from the principal zymotic diseases in the 16 districts registered during last week were equal to an annual rate of 3.2 per 1,000 the rates varying from 00 in 7 of the districts to 102 in Sligo, the 4 deaths from all causes registered in that district, comprising 2 from typhus. Among the 133 deaths from all causes registered in Belfast are 13 from measles (an equal number to that for the preceding week), 5 from whooping-cough, 2 from diphtheria, 4 from enteric fever, and 2 from diarrhœa; and the 29 deaths in Cork comprise 3 from measles and 1 from diarrhoa.
