DEATH OF ARCHDEACON HALPIN, P.P., V.G., RATHKEALE.

We regret to announce the death of the Ven Archdeacon John Halpin, P.P., V.G., Rathkeale, which took place yesterday morning at the Parochial House in that town. The Rev gentleman had been ailing for some time past. He was born at Cahirnorry, County Limerick, on the 31st March, 1820, and received his early education at the classical school in Kilmallock. He afterwards became a student in the Limerick College, and finished his studies at Maynooth. On his ordination he was appointed curate of St John's Cathedral, by the late Most Rev Dr Ryan, and for a number of years lived with his lordship in the closest intimacy, while he was also most popular with his flock. He was one of the few remaining clergymen in the diocese who had to pass through the perilous days of the cholera, and was remarkable for the heroic zeal with which he ministered to the poor plague-stricken patients in the lanes and alleys of St John's Parish. The late Most Rev Dr Butler promoted him to the pastoral charge of Kilfinane, and in 1876, on the death of the Rev Dr O'Shea, he was appointed P.P. of Rathkeale, and made Archdeacon and Vicar-General of the Diocese. He completed the tower of the new parish chapel and effected extensive improvements in the extension of the convent schools and grounds. Needless to say the Archdeacon was highly respected and esteemed by all classes, and his death is greatly regretted. Office and High Mass will be celebrated at Rathkeale on to-morrow at 11 o'clock. The Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer will preside.

THE LATE VERY REV DEAN MORIARTY, D.D.

The *Kerry Post* says—A man full of years, honor, and esteem has passed away from amongst us—one of whom every Kerryman may well be proud. Born in 1812, Dean Moriarty attained to more than the four score years, and during that long life of usefulness he displayed an energy and devotion in his Master's service, which won the confidence and affection of all who knew him. Ordained for a parish in the diocese of Meath in 1837, he declined substantial promotion at the hands of Bishop Alexander in order to take up Missionary work in his native place, Ventry. His works there are well known and recognised. The church and schoolhouses were built by him, and the whole machinery of the parish, and that of Donquinn, were organised by his efforts. Often in the winter months he had to cross over from Ventry to Donquinn by the steep roads that lead to the latter place, long before the break of day, amidst storm, or frost or snow. Often too had he to cross the dangerous Blasquet Sound in wild tempestuous weather when he carried his life in his hand; and this work he continued for many
