It is with feelings of deep regret that we aunounce this evening the death of a well-known and most respected citizen. Mr Joseph Bodkin Kennedy, which occurred early on Friday morning, at his residence, 28 Thomas-street. For some eighteen months or more he had been ailing, but no immediate danger seemed to threaten, although he had been attacked slightly some twelve months ago with the same symptoms which caused his end. On Thursday evening he attended a committee meeting of the Limerick Institution, and during its progress the attack became apparent. Everything that was possible was done, Dr Humphreys and Dr Malone being in quick attendance, and had him removed home, where Mr Kennedy passed quietly away at 12.30 p.m., having received the last rite of Holy Church. It may fairly be said that his was a wellknown figure in our midst. He was possessed of terling and manly qualities, a kindly and generous disposition, and an upright and conscientious character. In the family circle he was beloved and looked up to; was a model son and an affectionate brother. As a friend, "Joe Kennedy,' as he was familiarly styled, was sincere in the fullest sense of the word, and one that could be relied upon under any circumstances. He was closely identified with rowing in this city, having been an ardent carsman, and amongst other posts filled the office of captain of the Limerick Boat Club. He was a member of many of its premier crews, in the palmy days of this club, when Limerick held its own against "all comers." When the Limerick Races were held over Ballinacurra course, he was for years an active worker in connection with them, and in athletic circles he was prominent for a long time, and was in short a good all round portsman. In the commercial pursuits, in which he was engaged, he evinced much ability, and brought to hear that tact and energy which are the qualifications of every sound business man, and which placed him in a foremost position in his calling. Very general and widespread regret is felt at his early demise, in the prime of life, and to his family we tender our sincere sympathy in the severe trial which it has pleased Providence to visit them with. In the midst of this grief it must, however, be a matter of some consolation to know that amongst high and low he was held in the highest esteem, and his memory will not be easil, effaced in the minds of those with whom he was acquainted.

The funeral will leave Thomas street at ten o'clock on Sunday morning for St Mary's Cathedral, where the interment takes place in the family vault.
