MORTALITY STATISTICS—The average annual death-rate regresented by the deaths registered last week in the sixteen principal Town Districts of Ireland was 21:1 per 1,000 of the population. The deaths registered in the several towns, alphabetically arranged, corresponded to the following annual rates per 1,000—Armagh, 14:0. Belfrast, 22:7; Cork, 22:3; Drogheda, 3:8; Dablin, 20:0; Dynadik, 12:6; Galway, 11:3; Kilkonny, 18:9; Limerick, 22:5; Lisburn, 21:3; Londouderry, 20:4; Lungan, 36:5; Newry, 20:1; Sligo, 20:3; Waterford, 22:5; Wexford, 27:1. The deaths from the principal zymotic diseases in the 16 districts during last week were equal to an annual rate of 18 per 1,000, the rates varying from 0.0 in seven of the districts to 18:2 in Lungan; the 8 deaths from all causes registered in that district comprising I measles, 2 from scarlatina, 1 from whooging-cough. Among the 117 deaths from scarlatina, 2 from measles, 1 from whooping-cough, 1 from simple continued lever, 2 from enteric faver, and 1 from distribus; and the 16 deaths in Limerick comprise 3 from scarlatina and 1 from whooping-cough.
