ESTIMATES FOR REPAIRING, RE-UPHOLSTE

COUNTY LIMERICK HUNT.
 I witnessed the first meet of the well stocked covert of Knockaderry. My horse here observe was not burned down, but destroyed, as erroneously stated in some papers. Punctual to time Mr. Quinn put the pack into the thick gorse covers on the east side, and without much delay started, and carried the field across a bog into Rathfreedagh, where Reynard cut out manoeuvre his pursuers and sent his brush. The next draw was Ballinakill, and before the field collected an old fox carrying us at a topping pace through the bog, and then in a circle around through the bog again to Ballinakill, breaking away at Rathfreedagh, where after several bold runs the dogs, and a good deal of excitement at length run into and killed almost at the door of O'Grady's hospitable residence. A fox of seven good Irish miles had been taken, and was then about 2.30 p.m., and after the last ceremony, and after a brush, Mr. Gavin lead the way which was drawn blank, and next to the gorse, where time honored gorse held a fox. Luck and endurance proved the event. Hardly had the covers been tried when he went along the hilltop, crossing over the chapel and through the mill up the side of the Brown Hill at a good pace. Then, scarcely giving a moment's breathing time, he turned south and down the hill again, and passing the William Co-operative Dairy Factory, road, and never swerved nor flagged. He had Ballingarry cover again safe and sound fields ahead of the dogs, after a run of eight miles. Mr. Gavin was with the dogs at the finish. Creditable to relate, a number of the field were well up at the end of the day. Mrs. Bannatyne, who deserves to be mentioned for her splendid riding; the severity of the run was evident in the number who found the pace too trying, and a mishap to be "thrown out" and could not cope with the dogs again. This good fox did to keep his brush, and the chase after a most enjoyable day.
