A VESSEL RUNS INTO THE SHANNON FOR SHELTER.

TERRIBLE WEATHER AT SEA. (SPECIAL TELEGRAM FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.) Kilrush, Tuesday.

The full rigged ship "King George," 2,500 tons register (Captain Drummond), bound from Glasgow to Philadelphia, in ballast, put into the Shannon last night, necessitated by the violent gales encountered by her since she left port 23 days ago on her maiden voyage, and was not more than 250 miles from land during that period. The climax was reached on Thursday, 1st March, when a gale of frightful intensity sprang up, the fore and main lower topsails and fore and main back stays being blown clear away, and the seas, which run mountains high, sweeping the decks, carrying away everything move-able, straining the stanchions, and deluging the bunks with water. All of the 23 hands were called on deck, and were engaged for 12 hours without intermission in setting the ship at rights, the crew expecting every moment to see the masts go by the board. The vessel was then hove to for over 30 hours. One man was knocked down by a frightful sea, which threw him against the deckhouse and severely injured his leg, and he has not been able to resume work s.nce. The men suffered terribly from want of rest and sleep, the entire crew having to come on deck during the recent continuous gales, and had to remain for lengthy periods, being drenched to the skin.
