THE strike in America is rapidly approaching the dimensions of a civil war, whilst the state of things in Chicago itself bears no small resemblance to that in Paris under the Commune. The rioters in that city are apparently desirous of destroying all the property they can lay their hands on. Mobs assembled at the railway junction points early on Monday morning and destroyed the cars conveying milk to the citizens. Then they detached the engine, ran it back on the line at full speed, and dashed it into a line of cars smashing them into bits. The cars bringing provisions into the city are unloaded, and the meat is rotting owing to the heat of the weather. Crowds of excited men and women are gathered together at many points determined on every kind of violence and outrage. Railway and every kind of property is being fired. Up to the present over a thousand railway carriages have been burned. Fires are raging in various parts of Chicago, water cannot be easily obtained, and the firemen are powerless. The buildings of the World's Fair presented a temptation to burning that could not be resisted, consequently they were made bonfires of on the first opportunity. There have been many conflicts with those entrusted with the preservation of order, but up to the present the authorities are helpless. The strike has extended to Cleve-

Nobody anticipated or suspected that he showed any suicidal tendencies. An inquest was held yesterday by Coroner Cleary, and a verdict of suicide while suffering from temporary insanity was returned.
