We leave the answer to the guardians themselves-for by this time they are all fully acquainted with the merits of each, and we have Dr O'Shaughnessy, who certainly, from his long Poor Law experience, ought to be regarded as an authority, stating that " he did not make any complaint against any of the gentlemen who had been mentioned in connection with the appointment, but he say that not one of them was capable Master of that being Workhouse." The fact that £100 a year had in the first instance been recommended may have accounted for the non-appearance in the field of the Masters of some smaller Workhouses, but now that the salary is increased a trained man in all probability will look for the position, and in that event we trust the Guardians, in the interest of the poor and the ratepayers, will do their duty by electing him. To put in a crude outsider, with no Workhouse experience at all, or in fact to elect one whose years and experience would not command that moral respect which the position requires, would, in our opinion, be a fatal mistake. We cannot too strongly urge on the ex-officio Guardians the necessity of being present in full force on the election day, and to vote for a trained man who will be a solid advantage to the Institution and to the heavily-taxed ratepayers of this Union.
