A GRIM DISCOVERY.

A number of skeletons, with manacles attached to the leg and arm bones, have been found at a small depth below the surface of the ground in the courtyard of the Custom House of the port of St Petersburg. A similar discovery was made in the same place fifteen years ago, when a number of instruments of torture were also brought to light. The explanation of these finds is that in the last century the famous "Secret Chancel- lery" of the dreaded regent Biron, favourite of the Empress Anne, was situated where the Custom House now stands. The casements, where persons who had resisted the regent's tyrannical orders were tortured, stood also on the same site.
