New York, Friday.
 The Vigilant, which started yesterday for

The Irish members, says the *Standard*, have
 now very slight hopes that the Evicted Tenants
 Bill will be passed this Session. There is, in-
 deed, some expectation that the Opposition may,
 in the interests of the landlords, be induced to
 fall in with the plan proposed in the Bill; but,
 if the Bill is treated as highly contentious, it is
 recognised that to carry it this session is out of
 the question.

From the Intermediate Time Tables for 1894,
 which have just been issued, it appears that the
 Examinations will begin on Tuesday, 23rd. In
 the number of candidates this year there is an
 increase of 800 as compared with those of 1893.
 The total number of candidates is 8,300, against
 7,500 last year. The examinations will be held
 at 215 centres, of which 55 are metropolitan and
 160 provincial. They will be in charge of 215
 superintendents.
