PRIZE ESSAYS ON CANADA.

The Canadian Government is offering prizes for the preparation of papers on the history, geography, and resources of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, by scholars of 15 years of age and under, in the schools of the United Kingdom. Two sets of prizes are offered for England, one for Scotland, one for Ireland, and one for Wales. Each set of prizes consists of a first prize of £5, a second prize of £3, and a third prize of £1. The papers are not to contain more than 2,500 words, and must be sent in by May 1st next. A certificate must be placed at the end of each paper by the school-master or school-mistress, stating that it has been composed and written by the scholar whose name and address appears at the top, and that he or she is under 15 years of age. Any farther particulars may be obtained from the High Commissioner for Canada, 17, Victoria Street, S.W., or from any of the Canadian Government Agents.

The governors of the Richmond Lunatic Asylum did a very graceful act this week when they made the order for cancelling the name of a London firm in their contract for matches and substituting Patterson, of Dublin and Belfast. The match order was "safety matches," and I fancy the Board must be under the impression that they could be got nowhere but from England when the contract was first signed. Messrs Patterson have to be congratulated on their energy in taking up the question, and setting a good example for other firms not a hundred miles from home, who, if they showed a little more zeal in their endeavours to bring home manufacture to the front, would not now be in a state of semi-bankruptcy, as many are. The Press has lately been teeming with letters re woollens, etc but we, Irishmen, I am sorry to say, have not the "go" or thoroughness they seem to have in either England or Scotland in regard to pushing trade. Let the workers now assist by using no other "lights" but Irish.
