PROSECUTIONS TO BAILIFFS IN EAST CLARE.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT).

Executing some decrees for non payment in East Clare this week, Mr A R Martin, Sheriff, Ennis, and his staff met with the resistance from the parties from whom they attempted to seize, sticks and pitchforks were used against them. One of the first resisted was that of Thady Walsh, of Ballydoon, within two or three miles from the residence of Bodyke. The holding is on the estate of Sir George Bentick, and the tenant is worth about £45. As soon as the party, accompanied by Head-Constable O'Connell, Bodyke, and several constables, was approaching, Walsh and his two sons drove as fast as they could across the mountain and his party following at a quick pace when Martin overtook them a fierce struggle took place, the Walshes endeavouring to break the stock. They had pitchforks, and Martin in disarming one of the young fellows, was aided by Head-Constable McMahon, finding his use useless, had to order his men to charge with batons, and then the cattle were driven to a place of safety. Martin then proceeded to the holding of Simon Walsh, who owed £39 odd. Here more cattle were seized. The Thady Walsh's sons had again promised themselves with more pitchforks, and when their bailiffs attempted to drive away the stock, they made another determined attempt to rescue them, particularly a horse, which was taken from the stock. The police again had to charge with batons and use them freely, and it was a sharp struggle that Martin was able to take the cattle to Tulla pound. Prosecutions were commenced against the Walshes.
