OF AN ABANDONED SHIP'S CREW. Kilrush, Monday. A storm of great violence passed here, but beyond the carrying away of slates from the roofs of houses, occasioned by the severe character of the storm, not very great. No particulars have been reported of any casualties off the Western coast, the result of the violent weather. A vessel put into the Shannon, and came to anchor at the Kilrush roadstead. She proved to be the Prudhoe, Captain Guereidsen, of Chicoutimi for Tralee with deals, and crew as well, but the master of the vessel that on the 27th of October last, was wrecked on the banks of Newfoundland, he picked up the crew of the British ship Flora, which was on a voyage from Miriamichi to Swansea on a cargo of timber. The crew were abandoned their vessel as she got water-logged when the wind moderates the Prudhoe was towed to Fenit Pier, where the men of the crew will be put ashore and sent to their respective homes.

CLARE CASTLE FAIR. FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT. The yearly fair of Clare Castle was held in very unpropitious weather, the down-pour of rain converting the fair into a sea of mud. There was a fairly good number of cattle, but with a paucity of sheep, the business was unsatisfactory. This was marked in the better classes of good hinds, which were difficult to dispose of. For ewes were about the same as the late yearlings, and two year olds went for £9; two and a half year olds went for £13, and three and a half year olds for £10. Young cows went from £7 to £10, and old cows from £5 10s to £8; beef rated at £2 10s a cwt. It was a bad fair for sheep, but bullocks went well. In a sheep fair, prices were much about the same as in the late fair, and rated from about 33s to 35s. Mr Pierce O'Brien, J.P., sold a very nice sheep at 47s 6d; Dr Greene sold a lot of sheep at 36s; Mr Dawson sold two score at 36s 6d. As usual, there was a large show of foals, but there were very few buyers, and not very good hands. The prices went from £4
