## UNLAWFULLY AIDING THE SPANIARDS

A FINE OF £48.

At Cork Police Court yesterday, William Georgeson was prosecuted by the Board of Trade, for having contrary to the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act, engaged certain seamer without being licensed to do so. Evidence was given that the defendant had at his office in London hired a captain and crew to sail the gunboat Alverados to Cuba. She was built at Glasgow, and was going out to the war in Cuba flying the British flag when she broke down and put into Cork harbour for repairs. The court held that the defendant infringed the act and fined him £48.

THE SHIPBUILDING STRIKE.

All the remaining engineers employed at the shipbuilding yards of the Associated Masters' on the Clyde struck work yesterday and joined their locked-out comrades. The iron and coal industries of Scotland will be geriously affected by the stoppage of, works in the shippards, and the number of men thrown idle will be soon, therefore, largely increased. In Belfast additional workmen will be suspended on Friday evening. A written offer has been made to the engineers' delegate in Belfast by some prominent each for 900 engineers at Christmas should they return to work at once and accept the masters' terms. The delegate has replied de-clining the offer, and stating that the men are only holding out for what was promised them on the honour of the masters. In Glasgow yesterday posters were issued calling a meeting of the Scottish Federation of Ship-painters, who are of opinion that the opportunity is a favourable one for demanding an advance of wages,

FOREIGN AFFAIRS
