FATAL ACCIDENT AT A COUNTY LIMERICK CREAMERY.

As a man named Thomas Hayes, of Kilfinane, was engaged at a creamery in that place yesterday, he met with a very ugly accident. The machinery, having got out of order, he was struck by a portion of it, with the result that one of his legs was broken beneath the knee—he also received a compound fracture above the thigh. He was brought to the North Infirmary, Cork, by Dr Lee, Kilfinane, and last night Dr Cotter amputated the leg through the hip joint. The poor fellow did not survive the operation long, for he died about midnight.
