CHARGE OF INFANTICIDE IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

At Galbally Petty Sessions on Wednesday—before Mr Dickson, E.M. (in the chair), Dr M. R. Clery, Mr W. H. M. Bennett, General Ryan, and Mr Gubbins—a young girl named Mary Howard, a farm servant, was charged by District-Inspector Magee with wilfully killing her illegitimate child on the 8th March last, and a farmer named Patrick Quinlan was charged with being accessory thereto. Mr James G. Skinner, solicitor, Mitchelstown, appeared for the female prisoner; and Messrs. O'Dwyer, solr., and O'Shaughnessy, solr., Charleville, appeared for Patrick Quinlan. After some evidence of a general character had been given, the confession of the accused girl was read, in which she stated she left Kilmallock Workhouse on the 9th March with a male child, who was in good health. Subsequently she met Patrick Quinlan near Galbally, and she alleged he told her "to do away with the child, and to make a hole in the ditch and put it there. She strangled the child then." The female prisoner was returned for trial to the Assizes, and the police withdrew the prosecution against Patrick Quinlan, who was discharged. Mr O'Shaughnessy said it was very hard on an innocent man like Quinlan to be kept in gaol for such a long period without a particle of evidence against him.
