A GENEROUS ADDRESS.

(SPECIAL TELEGRAM.)

Dublin, Saturday Evening.

The Dublin Chamber of Comemree to-day presented an address of welcome to the Lord Lieutenant who, in reply, expressed himself touched with the cordiality of the reception by the people on the occasion of his State entry. He said he would do all in his power to perform the duties of his office, and heard with gladness of the tendency of thoughtful men to set aside political feelings and to co-operate in the promotion of the industries and development of the resources of Ireland.
