

THE LORD LIEUTENANT AND HIS STATE ENTRY.

A GENEROUS ADDRESS.

(SPECIAL TELEGRAM.)

Dublin, Saturday Evening.

The Dublin Chamber of Commerce to-day presented an address of welcome to the Lord Lieutenant who, in reply, expressed himself touched with the cordiality of the reception by the people on the occasion of his State entry. He said he would do all in his power to perform the duties of his office, and heard with gladness of the tendency of thoughtful men to set aside political feelings and to co-operate in the promotion of the industries and development of the resources of Ireland.

SERIOUS ROW OVER A COTTAGE.

SEVERAL PEOPLE INJURED.

Our Pallaskenny correspondent writes:—Intelligence has just reached here of a very serious row which occurred on Friday at Beigh, about five miles from here, in connection with the possession of a cottage. The information to hand is of a rather meagre character, but the following appear to be the main facts of the case:—A labourer named Michael Murphy held a freehold, which he has just sold to Mr Wm Waller, D L, intending to go to live in a labourer's cottage, which had been built for him. He was about to leave for his new abode, when two men named Connell, father and son, relations of his, came to take possession of the old house, and the row referred to was the result. Pitchforks, scythes, and hatchets were, it is alleged, freely used, and some very nasty wounds have been sustained on both sides. Murphy was severely stabbed on the arm, and sustained a severe scalp wound. His wife, who also took part
