ROYAL IRISH CONSTABULARY.

On the 1st inst. the new regulation whereby Head Constables of the R.I.C. are designated by the harp, crown, and shamrock badge, came into force. The permission to dispense with the four chevrons has been granted by the Inspector General on the general request of the Head Constables of the force. The badge is considered much smarter in appearance, and is more in accord with the warrant officer rank in the army. The new rule with regard to frocks for sergeants, acting-sergeants, and constables, also the new pattern great coat for all ranks, takes effect from the 1st inst.

SAD ACCIDENT IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

CAR-DRIVER CRUSHED TO DEATH.

On Tuesday night the police at Kilfinane were informed that a horse and cart were lying upset on the road at a place called Stokeens, near Elton, and that a man was lying dead under-neath the cart. Head-constable Fitzgibbon and some of his men proceeded at once to the place, and having turned the horse and cart, found the driver crushed to death underneath. On examining the body they identified it as being that of Patrick Kennedy, who had been carting timber from Kilmallock to Galbally, and when returning, the night being very dark, one of the wheels of the cart went up on an abutment of the road fence, and turning over, killed the unfortunate man instantly. He was about 60 years of age, and had a wife and several children depending or him. From what the police learned the accident had occurred some hours before they arrived at the place, and several persons passed and repassed but apparently took no trouble to ascertain whether the unfortunate man was alive or dead.
