DEATH OF THE REV JAMES M'MAHON.

We regret to announce the death of the Rev James Fitzgibbon MacMahon, M A, Rector of Grean, County Limerick, which took place to-day at his residence, Woodville, New Pallas. The rev gentleman, who was in his 68th year, was son of the late Mr James MacMahon, of 75 George street, Limerick. A representative of an old Limerick family, the rev gentleman was highly respected by all classes of the community, and his death, though not unexpected—for he had been ailing for over six months back—is deeply and universally regretted. He was ordained in 1853, when he took up a curacy in Lurgan, and some time afterwards became Rector of Ardcaunny, County Limerick. Then he moved to Knockaney, in the United Diocese of Cashel and Emly, his induction to which took place in 1864, and for very many years he has been Rector of Grean. He was a most kind hearted and genial gentleman, always on the most popular terms with his neighbours, and most anxious to assist, them by every means in his power. He had been connected with various committees of the Synod, and, we believe, he is the last of the annuitants of the diocese. His demise leaves a void that it will be difficult to fill, and the utmost sympathy is expressed with his esteemed family and relatives in their bereavement. The funeral will leave Woodville at ten o'clock on Monday morning for the family burial place at St Munchin's, Limerick.
