Lord Chancellor, said that they would reverse the declaration in the Vice-Chancellor's order, declaring that the rent charge created by the deed of 1889 was a performance and satisfaction of the contract in the marriage settlement and in substitution declare that the execution of the deed of 1889 was not a performance of that contract, and that Lady Elizabeth Spaight was now entitled to claim for the amounts payable to her under the contract notwithstanding the execution of that deed. The money that Lady Spaight got under the deed of 1889 was not the money of Sir Jas Spaight at all, but was money which was to be paid out of the estate of his brother, who, upon his death, would succeed him. Could it be said under these circumstances that the transaction was a discharge of an obligation to pay out of his own assets.

Lord Justice Barry and Lord Justice Walker concurred.

Judgment was given in this case. It was an appeal by the tenant from a decision of the Land Commission in which they confirmed the decision of the Sub-Commissioners, who dismissed the originating notice served by the tenant to have a fair rent fixed, on the ground that the farm, which consists of 151 Irish acres, situate in the county of Limerick, was let mainly for the purpose of pasture, and was therefore excluded from lease made in 1869, under which he was bound not to break more than 10 acres, at any one time, and he was not to break up more than 40 acres in grass. It was also provided that none of the meadowing and none of the manure should be sold off the farm. The defendant admitted to the Court below that he had never broken up more than 5 acres, and that the lands had been used from the beginning of the century as a dairy farm, and for four years he himself had used it as a dry stock farm—a pure pasture farm, having no tillage whatever.

The Court unanimously upheld the decision of the Land Commission.
