As there was a great déal of business to be done he did not think it necessary to dwell at any he did not think it necessary to dwell at any further length on the many qualities of head and heart which the late Mr Hastings possessed. SAD DROWNING FATALITY IN THE-DOCKS:

THE INQUEST.

To-day at three o'clock, Mr Coroner DeCourcey held an inquest in the City Courthouse on the body of Martin Walsh, an employee of the Limerick Board of Fishery Conservators, who was accidentally drowned from a ship in the Docks late last night.

Sergeant Flynn, Dock Station, conducted the

inquiry.
The first witness examined was James Salmon, The first witness examined was James Salmon, who deposed that he was engineer of the Conservators' steam launch; he knew the deceased, Martin Walsh, who was about 26 years of age, unmarried, and was employed as a matte bailiff; deceased joined the launch shout a month ago, his duty being to sleep on it during the day and at night on the Plassy station; the launch lay in the North West corner of the floating dock deceased was on the steam launch till about 11 celects westerday inforning, when he left and o'clock yesterday morning, when he left and returned about six o'clock; he again left with witness about 9 pm, and both went to Mrs Hall's witness about 9 pm, and both went to Mrs Hall's on the Dock Road, where deceased had a pint of stout, witness taking a bottle of hop bitters; witness and deceased then purted, and about a quarter past eleven the deceased returned to the docks, witness being on board a ship that came in; deceased came on board the ship, "Lindistitude of the wild of the farne "; witness saw deceased sitting on the rail of farne "; witness saw deceased sitting on the rail of the vessel, and afterwards heard a splash; he came along the quay at once, but could not see anything, as the night was dark; he ran for a long stick and called the deceased's name, but got no answer; there was no one with the deceased where he was sitting but the watchman; witness subsequently reported the matter at the police barracks.

To the Coroner—The deceased fell between the

ship and quay, and witness believed he was first ship and quay, and witness believed he was first stunned by striking the wall in the fall, and then stuck between the ship and the quay; after searching for a short time in company with Ser-geant Flynn, the body was recovered and brought ashore.

Thomas Crehan, the watchman on the "Lindisfarne," was next examined, and deposed that disfarne," was next examined, and deposed that he was on board the vessel last night about ten deposed he was on board the vessel last night about ten minutes past eleven, when he saw the deceased coming along the quay and on board; he sat on the rail; witness was speaking to the deceased for about two minutes, and suddenly the latter fell off the rails into the water; witness immediately sang out to the last witness, and ran ashore to get a rope, but there was not one handy at the time; both witness and Salmon did all they could to save the deceased, who never

and yet the time; both windes and calmed and all they could to save the deceased, who never came to the surface after going down.

The Coroner having addressed the jury, the Collowing verdict was returned:—"That the said Martin Walsh died on the 20th inst., and that his death was caused by drowning in the Docks, and that same was accidental."

The jury expressed an opinion that the light-
