DEATH OF MR. GEORGE BOYD.

We announce with much regret the death of an old and highly esteemed citizen, Mr George Boyd, head of the firm of Messrs J & G Boyd. Limited, who passed away at his residence, 2 Hartstonge-street, this morning, in the 76th year of his age. Mr Boyd had been suffering, from influenza for three weeks, but being of a fairly good constitution, a fatal termination was not feared, and his death was heard of with surprise and regret throughout the city to-day. Mr Boyd's name as a business man has been before the public for half a century, when with his elder brother, Mr James Boyd. who died in 1884, he founded the business of J & G Boyd, which commencing, as most things do, on a small scale, has now grown to its present very extensive dimensions. Four years ago the firm was converted into a Limited Liability Company, Mr Boyd being appointed Chairman. He was a very keen, shrewd businessman, and one who studied and thoroughly understood the requirements of the times. He was most courteous and considerate to his employees, by every one of whom he was held in the highest esteem, none the less so by the public, who always recognised that his word was as good as his bond. Of a most enterprising spirit, he had the pleasure of seeing one of the finest concerns in the country erected by Messrs J and G Boyd, and to the last he took the liveliest interest in its very extensive and most representative trading. death makes no change in the working of the concern, but by the directors and employees it is unfeignedly regretted. Mr Boyd was a very unobtrusive gentleman, and never took part in public affairs. The funeral will leave his late residence at ten o'clock on Tuesday morning for St Mary's Cathedral.

FOREIGN PRINTING AND THE MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT.

At the meeting of the Executive of the Limerick Trades Council held on Thursday evening, the following resolution was proposed by Mr R P O'Connor, seconded by Mr Gavin, and unanimously passed:—" That, in the opinion of this Trades Council, the present provisions and administration of the Merchandise Marks Act are totally inadequate to either safeguard the interests of British or Irish workers, employers, or purchasers, or to prevent imposition on the part of the foreign trader by illegally passing off spurious goods as native manufacture, as more particularly exemplified in the matter of foreign imported letterpress, chromo, and lithographic printing, whereby an immense sum is annually lost to the people of the United Kingdom-workers and consumers alike. We are also of opinion that a clause should be inserted in the Merchandise Marks Act Amendment Bill, now before the House of Commons, making it compulsory that each imported article printed in a foreign country shall bear a p-rmanent and legible imprint stating the country of origin and manufacture, and that a penalty shall be attached THE " GARHYOWEN FANCY FAI
