### DEATH OF DR J G CAHILL, NEWCASTLE WEST.

A general feeling of deep sorrow prevailed in Newcastle when the sad intelligence of Dr Cahill's death was announced on Friday morning last. He was in the prime of life, being only forty-four years. About three weeks ago he was stricken down with rheumatic fever, and although lung complications set in, strong hopes were entertained that with his splendid physical constitution he would pull through. His death is a serious loss to the people, and in an especial manner to the poor, to whom his professional services were ever freely given, and his unostentatious charity to relieve their immediate wants. The interment took place on Sunday, and the funeral cortege was one of the largest which has ever left the town, people of all classes joining in this tribute to the memory of one whom they sincerely esteemed and respected. The deepest sympathy is expressed for his sorrowing wife and young family in their truly sad bereavement.
