

THIS DAY'S PARLIAMENT.

(SPECIAL TELEGRAM.)

HOUSE OF COMMONS—THURSDAY.

The Speaker took the chair at 3-5. Notice had been given of seventy questions.

Mr JAMES STUART moved that in the case of the London County Tramway Bill the committee on the bill should have power if they think fit to insert in the Bill the provision empowering the Local Authority to run carriages upon tramways, mentioned in the Bill, and take tolls in respect thereof.

Mr BOULNOIS opposed the motion.

Dr MAGREGOR asked the Speaker why London local questions should occupy so much of the valuable time of the House (laughter). As a Scotchman pining for Scotch Legislation he protested against such an abuse of the privileges of the House (renewed laughter). He wished to know whether it was not on the part of London an adoption of all the privileges of Home Rule which were denied to Scotchmen.

The SPEAKER—It is not for me to say.

On a division, the motion was carried by 191 to 158.

DISESTABLISHMENT COMMISSIONERS.
