**DEATH OF A CENTENARIAN.**—A man of

The Dock is crowded with shipping just now,

 the arrivals during the week were the "Leech-  
 mere," 724 tons register, from Newcastle-on-  
 Tyne with a cargo of coals for the gas works;  
 the s.s. "Sully," 1,230 tons register, with a cargo  
 of 2,640 tons of maize from Poti for Messrs  
 Bannatyne; the s.s. "Ruabon," 1,284 tons register,  
 with a cargo of 2,800 tons of wheat from New  
 York. Ss "Isle of Hastings," one thousand and  
 two tons register, with a cargo of maize from  
 Poti, all consigned to Messrs Bannatyne. The  
 barque "Concurrent," six hundred tons register,  
 has arrived from Christiana with a cargo of  
 timber for Messrs Spaight and Sons.

### CHARGE OF ASSAULTING A BAILIFF.

Michael Geoghegan had Patrick Skerritt sum-  
 moned for assaulting him on the 17th instant.

The evidence of complainant and his wife wa

 and struck Geoghegan a blow, remarking "didn'  
 you nail me before last year;" Geoghegan said  
 he did, and then went away; he was followed  
 down the road by Skerritt, who struck him

 from him, and then knocked him on the road  
 his (complainant's) wife caught Skerritt and held
