The Chairman said they would proceed with the election, and asked the secretary, Mr Lee to read the applications he had received.

Mr Lee read applications for the position of dispensary doctor from Dr David Humphreys, Dr Haran, and Dr Medical Officer Barrington's Hospital.

Alderman Hall said since he had entered the room he had been asked to propose a candidate, and he came unpromised. He had told the members of one or two of the candidates that he would vote for the man that he considered best from his standpoint, and if it came to a poll that he would vote for the next day. He was quite sure that every member would be up his mind, and anything he would say would not affect a single vote. In justification of his intention he begged to propose Dr Humphreys. He considered he was the best of the three, and Dr Humphreys having a special study of ophthalmia, he would be of special advantage to the poor. He had great pleasure in proposing Dr Humphreys. Alderman O'Mara—I beg to second the nomination of Dr Humphreys.

Mr J B Barrington—I beg to propose Dr Mulcahy for the position. As an old friend I think he has a claim upon us, and judging from the work which he has done for the last few years while in Barrington's Hospital, he is well suited to a tend to the sick poor of the district.

Mr John George Kelly—I beg to second the nomination of Dr Mulcahy's nomination.

Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer begged to propose Dr Haran for the position. He would like to know the names of the members of the committee.
