THE POLITICAL CRISIS.

THE BEGINNING OF THE CAMPAIGN.

THE RETIRING GOVERNMENT AND THEIR TERMS.

LORD SALISBURY ACCEPTS OFFICE.

SELECTING THE CABINET.

Mr John Morley will address a large political gathering in Manchester on the 4th July. The mass meeting at Portsmouth which was to be addressed by Lord Salisbury to-night has been adjourned. It is understood that Lord Salisbury will have a further conference to-day with his leading supporters, including Mr Goschen in addition to the Duke Devonshire, Mr Balfour, and Mr Chamberlain. A contest will take place in all the seven divisions of Glasgow, and the Unionists are confident of improving their position.

Mr Akers Douglas, chief Conservative whip, joined Lord Salisbury soon after eleven o'clock, and among the subsequent callers were Lord Halsbury, Mr Balfour, Mr Goschen, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Mr Chamberlain, and the Duke of Devonshire, arriving in the order given.

The Press Association understands that the retiring Government are willing to give Lord Salisbury all reasonable facilities and assistance for passing either the remaining estimates or a vote on a account, in order that a general election may take place as soon as possible, but they will not be parties to any arrangement which would enable their successors to escape the necessity of appearing on the Treasury Bench and making some statement of policy prior to the dissolution.

The Press Association's Lobby correspondent states that there is some probability that Lord Salisbury will pay a further visit to the Queen at Windsor this afternoon, but that his lordship's movements at present are somewhat uncertain.

The Duke of Argyll paid a visit to the Queen to-day.

At the conclusion of the Unionist conference to-day Lord Salisbury left for Windsor by the 2 o'clock train. Mr Balfour and the Duke of Devonshire subsequently left together, preceded by Sir Michael Hicks Beach, but Mr Chamberlain, Mr Akers Douglas, and Mr McDonnell remained behind in conversation. Inquirers were officially informed that nothing regarding the conference could be communicated.

No Royal carriage was in waiting for Lord Salisbury at Windsor, and he walked to the Castle.

The Press Association understands that at Windsor this afternoon Lord Salisbury kissed hands on his acceptance of office as Prime Minister. His Lordship has already selected some of the leading members of his Cabinet.

The Press Association's Manchester correspondent telegraphs that a wire received there this afternoon from Mr Balfour states that Lord Salisbury has accepted office, and that the writ for Mr Balfour's resignation will be issued.
