### THE FRENCH AND MADAGASCAR.

It is reported at Liverpool that the French  
Admiralty have taken up a large Liverpool liner  
for the conveyance of gunboats and troops to

At a meeting of the Minister's to-day a des-  
patch was read to the effect that the British  
Government had decided not to publish a decla-  
ration of neutrality in regard to the conflict  
between France and Madagascar. Consequently  
the British Government have decided not to  
concern itself about the contracts concluded by  
British firms for the transportation of war  
materials for the use of the French troops in  
Madagascar.

### FROZEN TO DEATH.

ONE HUNDRED INQUESTS IN FOUR DAYS.  
During the past four days over one hundred  
inquests have been held in London, and in about  
eighty cases the intense cold was the direct  
or indirect cause of death. Out of  
ten inquiries in the East-end on Thursday,  
eight deaths were shown to have resulted from  
the severe weather. A similar case is reported  
at Chelsea, and another at Kensington. Dr Dan-  
ford Thomas held inquests at Hampstead, St  
Pancras, and Marylebone on persons whose deaths  
had been accelerated by the cold, and he said he  
had had thirty such cases this week.
