SUDDEN DEATH.

Mr Coroner De Courcey held an inquest at 5. Denmark street last evening touching the death of Paul Hickie, aged thirty, who was found deatin bed yesterday morning. From the evidence it appeared that Hickie suffered from apoplectic fits, and was in feeble health. On Sunday night he retired to bed at an early hour, another man named Jones sleeping with him. He complained about half-past nine of being cold, and at his request Jones procured some extra clothing. The latter subsequently fell asleep, and when he woke next morning he found Hickie dead by his side. Medical evidence having been given by Dr John R Holmes, the jury returned a verdict of death from apoplexy. Head Constable McBrinn conducted the inquiry.
