THE LATE MR ROBERT HUNT.

At a special meeting of the Select Vestry of S Michael's Parish on Wednesday, the 30th, at 4 o'clock, p m, the Ven. the Archdeacon in the chair, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, and a copy ordered to be forwarded to the relatives of the late Mr Robert Hunt:—
"That the Select Vestry of S. Michael's on their own behalf, and in accordance with the wishes of many members of the congregation, desire to express their deep regret at the death of Mr Robert Hunt, who for such a very long period was a staunch friend and supporter in all matters connected with S Michael's Parish, contributing liberally not only to our local parochial charities, but also most generously towards various improvements in the Parish Church, the erection of school house and master's residence, besides purchasing and laying out a large portion of ground as a church enclosure, in all which undertakings he showed a warm and personal interest. This resolution is intended as a slight and unanimous tribute of respect for his memory, and sympathy with his family."

LORD DUNRAVEN AND THE LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL.

On Saturday night a meeting of the workers in the forthcoming election of county councillors for the borough of Wandsworth was held at St Faith's-school, Wandsworth. The Earl of Dunraven, one of the Unionist candidates for the borough, said he thought the County Council had done a great deal of good work, but what he objected to principally in the Council, as at present constituted, was that the majority were endeavouring to acquire powers to which they were not entitled and commencing to interfere in matters not within their province. He doubted very much whether it was of any advantage to the ratepayers or anybody else that the London County Council were endeavouring to assimilate and absorb all private enterprise and become great manufacturers and contractors and conduct all businesses. For the past 20 years legislative efforts had been in the opposite direction to centralization. It was absolutely impossible for one body like the County Council to conduct the affairs of such a vast community of people properly and efficiently.

A vote of confidence in Lord Dunraven and Dr Longstaff was unanimously agreed to,
