SAD FATAL ACCIDENT.—Mr M J McDonnell coroner, held an inquest on Wednesday evening at Ballinvoher, near Miltown, on the body of a farmer named James Kenerk, who met his death the previous evening when returning from Rathkeale, by falling from his car. Deceased was conveyed home unconscious and died in a few hours without regaining consciousness. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.—Cor.

MORTALITY STATISTICS.—The average annual death-rate represented by the deaths registered last week in the sixteen principal Town Districts of Ireland was 348 per 1,000 of the population. The deaths registered in the several towns, alphabetically arranged, corresponded to the following annual rates per 1,000:—Armagh, 21:0; Belfast, 35.9; Cork, 24.; Drogheda, 26.4; Dublin, 42'4; Dundalk, 46'1; Galway, 49'1; Kilkenny, 9'4; Limerick, 16'8; Lisburn, 25'7; Londonderry, 17'3; Lurgan, 81'9; Newry, 24'1; Sligo, 35'5; Waterford, 150; Wexford, 31 6. The deaths from the principal symotic diseases in the 16 districts during last week were equal to an annual rate of 1 6 per 1,000, the rates varying from 0:0 in ten of the districts to 46 in Lurgan; the 7 deaths from all causes registered in that district com prising 1 from measles. Among the 188 deaths from all causes registered in Belfast are 2 from measles, 1 from typhus, I from whooping-cough, 1 from simple continued fever, 3 from enteric fever, and 4 from diarrhoea.
