at petty sessions for an assault on a woman named Walsh. This arose out of the "boy-cotting" of Mr J. B. Hewson, who, as the word conveys, has been subjected to disgraceful treatment because of his taking some fields adjacent to his demesne which had been evicted, and which the next in succession had not taken up, but had allowed to remain derelict for many years. It seems that the woman's offence was that she conveyed goods for Mr Hewson, and she was struck in the face three times by the defendant. His Honor declared that he would not minimise any punishment inflicted by the magistrates on persons who took part in this "disgraceful business," and acting on this determination he affirmed the conviction of the magistrates, and in addition ordered the defendant to be imprisoned for one month with hard labour. This decision will have a salutary effect in upholding the ordinary rights of citizenship which have unfortunately been so often violated in this country in past years.
