#### REFERENCES AT PATRICKSWELL SESSIONS.

General Lord Clarina, addressing the court, who is about to be transferred to New Meath, said—Mr Irwin, as I believe on the last occasion upon which we shall be able to avail ourselves of his able assistance at the Patrickswell Petty Sessions, I cannot refrain from expressing my personal regret at your removal from the Bench, which your ability and impartiality are so well known and appreciated. I am not aware of the reasons why you have been transferred to another part of Ireland, but you have no objection of feeling that you were unappreciated in this county as a just, courteous resident magistrate, and of the high opinion which we formerly held of you, thoroughly well merited, is the Government of the day, at a time when having so often specially selected you for important cases in different parts of the county, requiring a magistrate possessing legal knowledge and ability, together with a calm, unruffled temper and a thorough
