DROWNING ACCIDENT AT THE DOCKS.

Mr DeCourcy and a jury held an inquest this morning at eleven o'clock at, No 4 Broad street, on the body on a man named Patrick O'Grady, aged 28 years, who was drowned yesterday in the Docks. Sergeant Flynn, Dock Station, conducted the inquiry on behalf of the police.

Mary O'Grady identified the body as that of her husband; she last saw him alive at 5 o'clock on yesterday morning, when he went to work at the docks; deceased was not subject to fits.

John McNamara deposed that deceased was employed by his brother to land some timber which was lying in the water at the docks, having been brought in by the steamship Leyden; witness saw deceased standing on the timber and suddenly disappear; he and two other men did their utmost to get deceased out of the water, but he sank under the timber and never rose; after about three quarters of an hour a man named William Naughton succeeded in raising the body with a boat kook; they brought him on board the ship and sent for the doctor who pronounced life extinct.

Dr Shanahan deposed to examining the body of deceased on board the Leyden; there were a few scratches on his face, which might have been caused by knocking against the timber; death was due to drowning.

The jury returned a verdict to the effect that the deceased man met his death by accidental drowning.

THE LATE HON MRS VAUGHAN.

The Honourable Mrs Vaughan, who died at a very advanced age last week in London, was the relict of the Hon George Vaughan, second son of the third Earl of Lisburn. Mrs. Vaughan was the daughter of John Howley, Esq., of Rich Hill, Co. Limerick, and closely related to the McCarthy O'Learys of Coomlegane, and to the Ryans of Scarteen, county Tipperary. The Empress Eugenie; Mrs Vaughan's devoted friend for many years, attended the funeral service at St Mary's, Chelsea, and herself laid a beautiful tribute of flowers, from Farnboro', upon the coffin. Mrs Vaughan's eldest son was married to Laura, youngest daughter of the late Charles Moore, Esq. Mooresfort, Co Tipperary.
