THE LABOURERS' ACT IN LIMERICK UNION.

LIVELY PROCEEDINGS AT THE RURAL SANITARY BOARD.

A meeting of the Rural Sanitary Board was held to-day—Mr Thomas Bourke presiding. The other members present were—Mr John M'Inerney, Mr John O'Connor, Mr Michael Laffan, Mr Wm Fitzgerald, Mr Daniel McMahon, and Mr P O'Donoghue.

Mr H J Guinane, Clerk; Mr Joseph O'Malley, B E, Engineer, and Mr McCoy sol (acting for Mr Ryan), were in attendance.

The Clerk read a letter from the labourers of the Mount Ievers Division, strongly protesting against the changing of a site at Ballylicane West, and stating that if the sites were changed contrary to their desire, they would call on the Local Government Board to interfere.

The letter was marked "read." A deputation of about twenty labourers from the several electoral divisions of the union attended for the purpose of urging on the guardians to proceed with the erection of cottages.

Mr Moran, sol, attended on behalf of the labourers, and asked that Mr Hickey, Secretary of the Labour Association, should be allowed to address the meeting.

The Chairman acceded to the application. Mr Hickey then made a lengthened statement, and pointed out the grievance from which the labourers suffer. He said they were under the impression that they were deprived of what had been for a long time promised. There were labourers there who had been waiting for cottages for the last ten or eleven years, and up to the present they had not succeeded in securing that which by Act of Parliament they were entitled to. He attributed a great deal of the blame to the farmers who showed opposition to the labourers getting land. If the farmers had not got their rights it was certainly not the fault of the labourers, who had given their support and assistance in the agitation by which any benefit that resulted was got by the farmers. If the Government of the country did not enforce the Act the Boards of Guardians of the country ought to take an active part. The labourers had forfeited the good livings which the gentry of the country used to give them to assist the farmers, and he thought the large farmers and the Boards of Guardians should do their duty to the labourers who had stood by them in the time of agitation.

Mr Moran asked Mr McCoy when an inquiry would be held.

Mr McCoy said as regards the fourth scheme the draft award had been received, and the final award would probably be had in about three weeks time.

Mr Moran said, on behalf of the labourers he had to complain of the great delay which had occurred in carrying out the schemes.

Mr M'Inerney—We could not move a peg until we got the award, and it was not our fault.

Mr Moran (warmly)—On behalf of the labourers, I say there has been unreasonable delay, and in justice to the labourers I denounce it.

Mr O'Connor—As one of the Nationalist members of this Board, I say we are doing our duty.

Mr Moran—You are in a slipshod fashion. I is scheming all round.
