Mr Joseph Gaffney considered the fireman had

peculiar time.

Captain Wyld in a further report stated that
the efficiency of the brigade would not be im-
proved even that the increase were granted, and
he recommended that the Corporation allow him
three permanent men at 18s per week, uniform
and residence, at an annual cost of £17 3s 11d,
the permanent men not to receive any extra
money for fires or practices. He should have men
on duty day and night so that they could turn out
instantaneously. Ten volunteers with these per-
manent employees would then be adequate.

It was agreed to summon a special meeting of
the committee to consider the reports.

REPORTED SHOOTING OUTRAGE.

Our Ennis correspondent writes:—News has
just reached here that about 2 p m yester-
day morning the house of a farmer named
Michael Roche, of Derhunaniadra, near Kilaaboy,
was visited by moonlighters, who fired three
revolver shots through one of the bedroom win-
dows. The children were sleeping in the room
at the time, but happily none of them was in-
jured. The police are investigating the outrage,
which is attributed to some local dispute over
herds in the locality.

SUICIDE IN THE COUNTY LIMERICK.

It is reported from Old Pa las that a publican
named Raleigh has committed suicide by shoot-
ing himself. Last night he retired to bed in his
usual health, and this morning was found dead
in a room adjoining the bedroom. A double-
barrelled gun was found by his side, one of the
discharges having apparently passed through his
heart. It is stated that Raleigh had been in
pecuniary trouble.

FOUR HUNDRED MEN RESCUED.

Four hundred men, imprisoned in the colliery
at Whitwood, near Normanton, were all rescued
during the night by being lowered from the

Nelson & Co.

THE GREAT JEWEL CASE.

The hearing of the Tasker jewel case was
resumed to-day. Mr Rowe, the defendant
Streeter's late secretary, admitted that the
books showed sales to plaintiff in two days of
about £100,000. Mr Streeter, next examined,
said he knew nothing personally of the trans-
actions between his manager and Tasker. He
employed Col. Birch, an Indian authority, to
write a history of the Agra diamond. Defen-
dant called experts to show that fair prices were
charged for the diamonds sold.

Mr Darling, replying for the plaintiff, said that
according to the pedigree supplied of the Agra
diamond, it passed "subsequently" into the hands
of Indian potentates who had actually died nearly
two hundred years before. He had proved false
representation, and asked that plaintiff should
have his money back.

Counsel resumed his seat amid loud applause
and the case was again adjourned.

THE AMERICA CUP.

New York, Tuesday.

The Yacht Club has decided that both the
challenger and the defender in the race for the
America Cup shall be allowed three men forever
five feet of racing length. This will give the
Valkyrie 62 and the American ship 61 men.
