THE GREAT JEWEL CASE.

The hearing of the Tasker jewel case was Mr Rowe, the defendant resumed to-day. Streeter's late secretary, admitted that the books showed sales to plaintiff in two days of about £100,000. Mr Streeter, next examined, said he knew nothing personally of the transactions between his manager and Tasker. He employed Col. Birch, an Indian authority, to write a history of the Agra diamond. Defendant called experts to show that fair prices were charged for the diamonds sold.

Mr Darling, replying for the plaintiff, said that according to the pedigree supplied of the Agra diamond, it passed "subsequently" into the hands of Indian potentates who had actually died nearly two hundred years before. He had proved false representation, and asked that plaintiff should have his money back.

Counsel resumed his seat amid loud applause and the case was again adjourned.
