DEATH OF VISCOUNT GOUGH.

Viscount Gough died yesterday at his residence,
St Helen's, Booterstown. The deceased nobleman,
who had attained his eighty-first year in January
last, had been ailing since December of last year.
His eldest son, the Hon Hugh Gough, who suc-
ceeds to the title, Principal Secretary of the Eng-
lish Embassy at Washington, U.S.A., and his second
son, Colonel Gough, of the 14th Hussars, were
both absent. The deceased nobleman, George
Stephens Gough, was the second Viscount, and
at his death had well entered his eighty-first
year, having been born in January, 1815. He
succeeded his father in 1869, and, like him, de-
voted himself to a military life, in the course of
which he served in China with great distinction.
He was a D.L. and J.P. for the counties of Galway
and Tipperary. His lordship was twice married,
—first in 1840, to Mrs Wray Palliser, who only
survived a year; and, secondly, to Miss Arouth
not (who died in 1892).

A WOMAN DROWNED IN THE CANAL.

An old woman, identified as Alice Ruttle, of
Patrickswell, was found drowned in the Canal
yesterday morning. The body was removed to
the morgue, and at four o'clock an inquest was
held by Mr Coroner DeCoursey. Head-Constable
Feeney conducted the inquiry.

Thomas McNamara, of the Abbey, a fisherman,
deposed to finding the body in the Canal, above
the Company's stores. His attention was at-
tracted by clothes floating in the water. He
assisted in taking the body out of the Canal, and
reported the circumstance to the John-street
police.

Constable J. Corbett, Patrickswell, identified
the deceased as Alice Ruttle. He had known her
for five years living at Ballygeale, near Patrickswell.
She lived with her husband, who is an
invalid, and both were in destitute circumstances.
She was of eccentric habits, and took drink peri-
odically. She left home yesterday morning,
having told her husband that she was going to
Patrickswell to buy spectacles. She was aged 84
years and married 62 years.

Dr Mulcahy, Barrington's Hospital, stated that
the body presented the usual external appear-
ances of having been drowned.

Acting-Sergeant Riordan produced a return
railway ticket to Patrickswell found on the
deceased, and 1s 0½d in money.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental
drowning.

SUICIDE IN CLARE.

Dr William Sexton, Coroner for West Clare,
has held an inquest at Kilfarboy, adjacent to
Miltown Malbay, on the remains of a woman
named Malone, whose body was found in the sea
at Cregg, not far from Lahinch. It appeared
that the unfortunate woman had recently dis-
played symptoms of mental derangement, but
had succeeded in eluding the vigilance of her
relatives by going on an errand to some friends
in another part of the county. She left them
with the intention of proceeding to the church-
yard at Kilfarboy, where some of her people
were interred, but not returning, a search re-
sulted in the discovery of her dead body. She
leaves a large family behind her, with whom the
greatest sympathy is felt.
