relied on. In business matters as in private life  
he was deservedly popular. One of the most  
extensive land agents in the South of  
Ireland, he always maintained the most  
cordial relations with the tenantry of  
the various estates with which he had to deal,  
and even in the critical and stormy period of  
the land agitation, these relations continued  
unimpaired. For over forty-years Mr Hunt has  
been rate collector of the city, and for a long  
period he had been a Barony High Constable. In  
public life, Mr Hunt took a considerable part.  
He was, we dare say, the oldest surviving  
governor of the Limerick District Lunatic  
Asylum; a governor of Barrington's and St  
John's Hospitals, and served very frequently  
on the County Limerick Grand Jury. Mr Hunt  
was a member of the Diocesan Synod, and one of  
the Governors of the old board of Leamy's School.  
Deceased gentleman held the Commission of the  
Peace for the counties of Limerick and Clare.  
He lived to a fine old age, in the enjoyment of  
the last of all his faculties, and he has now  
passed away deeply regretted by a very large  
circle of friends, and scarcely in a lesser degree by  
the public in general. A man's good works, we  
are told, live after him, and never was this more  
truly written than in the case of the gentleman  
whose death we mourn this evening.

**THE LATE CANON LLOYD.**

A Broadford correspondent writes—The funeral  
of the late Rev Canon Lloyd took place on  
Wednesday last, and was largely attended by his  
parishioners and the Clergy of the Diocese. The  
Service was conducted by the Rev J B Greer,  
Rector of Tulla, assisted by the Rev T B Robert-  
son, Rector of Newmarket-on-Fergus. The re-  
mains were afterwards removed for interment  
from the Church, in which he breathed his last,  
to the adjoining churchyard, and he now sleeps  
in a grave prepared for him not many feet from  
the pulpit from which he faithfully preached the  
Gospel for twenty-one years. Canon Lloyd is  
deeply regretted by a large circle of friends and  
acquaintances.

**THE DROWNING OF CAPTAIN SCALLON.**

The crew of the barque "Aurora," which has  
arrived in port, give some particulars of the  
drowning of Captain Scallon off the South Coast  
on Friday night, December 21st. The vessel had  
been making for Limerick with a cargo of coal  
from Troon, on the Scotch coast. Owing to heavy  
weather, the captain put into Queenstown for a  
few days, and on weighing anchor, again set sail  
for Limerick. The weather had become again  
very severe, and he was obliged to alter his course  
for Passage West. When about ten miles to the  
south-east of Queenstown, the worst effects of  
a gale were experienced, and at eleven o'clock at  
night, while Captain Scallon and two of the crew  
were engaged on the main top sail the captain,  
who was attired in oil-clothes and heavy boots,  
was swept from his position into the raging sea.  
His companions noticed his fall, but neither  
these nor those on deck were able to  
render assistance, as the man disappeared  
almost immediately. The sea was running very  
high at the time, and the vessel was subjected  
to a great strain, the waves washing over the  
deck, and carrying away the mainstay sail, the  
boat, and water-tank. The loss of the latter left  
the crew without fresh water for a couple of days,  
and made them dependent on the saving of rain  
water. After a couple of days Passage West was  
reached, and the loss of the captain reported.  
The crew speak in the highest terms of the  
excellent sea-going qualities and character of the  
late Captain Scallon.
