**MORTALITY STATISTICS.**—The average death-rate represented by the data for the last week in the six principal towns of Ireland was 33.4 per 1,000 of the population. The deaths registered in the week are alphabetically arranged, and correspond following annual rates per 1,000:—A B-hart, 29.6; Cork, 42.2; Drogheda, 31.8; Dundalk, 16.8; Galway, 34.0; 37.8; Limerick, 42.1; Lisburn, 21.3; 1 28.3; Lurgan, 123.2; Newry, 40.2; Waterford, 32.5; Wexford, 49.7. The three principal zymotic diseases in the last week were equal to an average of 2.2 per 1,000, the rates varying from 0.6 in the districts to 59.3 in Lurgan; 1 from all causes registered in that district being 7 from measles, 1 from typhoid, 1 from whooping-cough. Among the 156 zymotic causes registered in Belfast were 87 from whooping-cough, 1 from diphtheria, 1 from enteric fever, and 1 from cholera. The total deaths in Cork county during the week were 30, and the 30 deaths in the county were as follows:—
