DEATH OF MR. M. WALSH, FOYNES.—We regret to announce the death of Mr Michael Walsh, contractor, which took place at his residence, Monteagle Hotel, Foynes, on Tuesday last. Few men were better known in the county and many districts outside it, than Mr Walsh, who in his time carried out numerous extensive contracts, and proved himself a capital business man, and one who gained the esteem of all that came in contact with him. The funeral, which took place to-day at Askeaton, was very large and representative.

MASONIC SERVICE AT ST MARY'S CATHEDRAL.

Last evening a Masonic Service in connection with the Provincial Grand Lodge of North Munster was held in St Mary's Cathedral. Some one hundred and twenty Brethren representative of the various lodges in the Province were present. Wearing their insignia and the various distinctions according to rank, they proceeded two deep in the following order from the Jebb Chapel, where they robed, to the places specially reserved for them in the transepts:—The Blue or Craft Masons, the Royal Arch Masons, the Knights Templar, the Prince R C Masons, the Provincial Grand Lodge Officers, Past Provincial Grand Wardens, the Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master (Mr F. G. M. Kennedy), and the Right Worshipful Provincial Grand Master (Sir Chas. Barrington, Bart). On taking his seat the P.G.M. had on his right the Deputy Grand Master and on his left the Provincial Grand Secretary (Mr R. Lee.) A large number of the general public were also present. The special service opened with the 333rd hymn, "Glorious things of thee are spoken," and the other hymns selected were 276, "Lead kindly light," and 275, "With one consent," which was sung immediately previous to the Benediction. The officiating clergy were the Dean, the Archdeacon, and the Rev W. J. Adams. The special preacher was the Rev Canon Carmichel of Dublin, who delivered an appropriate discourse on the life of St John the Baptist, whose great principles the craft expressed its devotion to. The service, which lasted something over an hour, was very impressive in its nature.
