 paper in its reports of Mr O'Brien's speeches,
 and certain resolutions.
 The writs, in connection with the same
 matter, are, we believe, not unlikely to be issued
 during the next few days.

R LODGE DESTROYED BY FIRE.

R Lodge, the residence of the Duke and
 Duchess of Fife, at Braemar, was yesterday des-
 troyed by fire. The cause of the fire is unknown,
 but is supposed to have originated in the apart-
 ment of her Royal Highness. Most of the
 furniture was saved. Several workmen were in-
 volved in attempting to extinguish the flames, and
 one narrowly escaped suffocation. Her
 Majesty the Queen drove from Balmoral to view
 the disastrous conflagration.

WATER IN BUTTER.

The House of Commons on Thursday, reply-
 ing to Mr Abraham, Sir Walter Foster said the
 Committee on the Adulteration of Food
 had not yet reported. From the evi-
 dence before them it appeared that there was no
 standard of water in butter, and Somerset
 had not fixed any such standard. When
 the Committee had reported he hoped the local
 authorities would be better informed in the
 future.
