O'BRIEN ON STRIKES IN LIMERICK.

The Assize on Tuesday arising out of a case in which it was stated that the City of Limerick Steampacket Company had some years ago taken up premises held in Limerick, Mr O'Brien remarked that he did not know of any other connection a circumstance came under his notice, and he thought it worth mentioning to the jury, who were a body of respectable gentlemen. Some time ago a cargo came to Limerick with a cargo from the west, and great trouble was caused about the cargo. He had a conversation with the manager of the Company who owned the vessel, and he informed him that owing to the conduct of the porters engaged in discharging that cargo the Company would never under any consideration whatever, send any of their vessels to Limerick. Later on the same day he took occasion to observe that he had seen many beautiful houses built in the western portion of the city. If the city is to be built in one direction it is satisfactory that it is not to be built in another.

NEWCASTLE WEST KNITTING INDUSTRY.

It is most essential, nay, it is the duty of every Irishman, to encourage and promote the assistance in his power in fostering and encouraging Irish industries, thus showing to the world our desire to remain in and for the advancement of our country. Mrs Ambrose has deserved great merit indeed for launching a new and useful industry into Newcastle West, and we are sure, will go on developing and increasing its labour, and we sincerely wish success to which it is truly entitled.
