DISCOVERY OF ANCIENT TOBACCO PIPES.

While the gravel pits were being overturned in a garden at the rear of a house in Fairmead-road, Upper Holloway, three ancient tobacco pipes were discovered. The oldest compares in shape with those in the Guildhall Museum dated time of Charles I, 1625-48. The other two are similar to those discovered in Took's-court, Cursiter-street, now in the Guildhall Museum, of late seventeenth or early eighteenth century date. They are not in a good state of preservation.
