SIXMILE-BRIDGE PETTY SESSIONS.

These Sessions were held on Tuesday, before Mr Solomon Frost (presiding) and Mr Fitzjames Kelly. A resolution was proposed by Mr Frost and seconded by Mr Kelly expressing regret and conveying sympathy to Mr Cottingham, D.I., in his recent bereavement. It also conveyed to Mr Cottingham the expression of regret the court felt at hearing that he was about to leave the district, where his services have been so highly valued. Head-Constable Nagle, on behalf of Mr Cottingham, returned thanks. Mr Thos. Frost, C.P.S., joined in the resolution proposed.

DEATH OF THE EARL OF MACCLESFIELD.

The Earl of Macclesfield died at his residence, 94 Eaton square, yesterday afternoon. His Lordship had been in ill health for some time past, and recently became more seriously indisposed, and at his advanced age the end was not unexpected. He is succeeded by his grandson, Viscount Parker.

THE NAVAL MANŒUVRES.

The naval manœuvres have reached the stage of the outbreak of war. Yesterday a squadron composed of the Magnificent (flagship), Hermione, Hazard, Bellona, Halcyon, Antelope, Ramillies, and Blenheim, with six torpedo boats, anchored in the man-of-war roads outside Kingstown, and after taking in water proceeded south last evening, accompanied by a number of torpedo boat destroyers, which had previously anchored in the harbour, to encounter the enemy in the vicinity of Berhaven.

The case for the prosecution in the trial at Bar of Dr Jameson and his five co-defendants for the Transvaal raid concluded yesterday, and the trial was then adjourned till Monday for Sir Edward Clarke's speech on their behalf. No evidence will be called for the defence.
