The Belfast demand, as was stated at the previous conference, was immediate demand of ashilling with a second shilling in April. The terms of the Carlisle toe were placed by ballot before the men of the districts involved. The terms now vere to the Clyde men an immediate advance of a halfpenny an hour total men earning less than 7d per hour, and of a farthing an hour to all paid at or above that rate. To Belfast an immediate advance of one shilling per week all round. Both terms were to hold good for 6 months, and any intended change was to be notified one month in advance.
