## DROWNING ACCIDENT.

A sad drowning accident occurred in Limerick on Thursday night. It seems an elderly man named John Ryan, a cook on board the ss. Shannon left the vessel early in the night for the purpose of getting some provisions. He visited Mrs Touhy's, of Mountkennet, where he made some purchases, and about eleven o'clock he proceeded to the steamer, which lay outside the Lower Shannon Company's Offices. A night watchman named Hehir, who is employed by the Company, heard a splash in the water about this time, but there was no cry or alarm of any sort. However the deceased was reported missing next morning. and a search was made in the vicinity of Limerick, but the body was found some twelve hours after the fatality in a creek at Meelick, five miles below the city. It was, strange to say, discovered in a perpendicular position, and it is a very rare circumstance to succeed in recovering a body so soon. An inquest was held, and a verdict of accidental death returned. The remains were interred to day in Mount St Lawrence Cometery. Deceased, who was a very respectable old man, was a native of Kilrush, he was a widower, but, it seems, had no one depending on him. He was in the employment the Company for several years.
