BUTTER PROSECUTION AT KILRUSH.

At the weekly Petty Sessions to-day, before Mr. Hector S Vandeleur, D L (Chairman); Mr A M Hector's Vandeleur, D. L. (Charman); are a larger, R. M.; G. Vandeleur Reeves, Mr. F. J. Eager, a farmer named Andrew O'Neill, was charged with exposing for sale in the Kilrush Markets, a firkin of butter containing an excessive percentage of water, amounting to adult ration.

Mr James Gaffney, solicitor, Limerick, said he appeared to prosecute in this matter. He would appeal to the Court, after they had beard the evidence, to inflict a severe penalty in the interest of the farmers themselves. The penalty would no doubt affect the poor woman who was defendant, but it would prove beneficial to an industry which the Irish farmers themselves were doing their best to desiroy.

Mr Hilliard, solicitor, defended.

Sergesnt Tuchy, Inspector of Food and Drugs, gave evidence as to the purchase of a pound of butter from the defendant in the, public market at Kilrush; be informed her it was for analysis; he, in the usual way, gave her one portion, retained another, and forwarded the third to the public analyst; he now handed in the certificate received from Sir Charles Cameron, which set forth that the butter contained 27:26 per cent of water; 16 per cent was the maximum allowed.

Mr Hilliard—Did Mrs O'Neill volunteer any explanation, or make a statement?

Witness—No; I did not ask for any information, but discharged my duty as inspector.

Mr Hilliard—Your worships, I take it that the Commission of Inquiry into this butter question came as far as I know to the conclusion ithat 20 per cent was the maximum sllowed of water. What I ask you to do in this case, where there is an excess of 7 per cent of water, is not to dea with it in the same as manner a case where there would be 26 per cent. To be sure there must be a fine in the present instance, and I want to argue that you should take it as a case in itself and in fine in the present instance, and I want to argue that you should take it as a case in itself and inquire into the particular circumstances as to how this particular butter was made and manufac-tured. You may remember that the 20th of August—the date on which this butter was made August—the date on which this butter was made —was hot, particularly so, and it was impossible to make the butter. As I will prove to you, Mrs O'Neill was compelled in consequence to put her butter in water for a day and a balt before she was able to work it. These are the elements I wish to mention that should be taken into

consideration.
